5 ideas to smooth the summer

The summer holidays can sometimes be challenging, but they are an occasion to spend quality time with your families, try new experiences and make new memories. Here are some ideas and advice to help you plan your summer time with your kids.

Encourage movement

In the sunny weather, it may be a good idea to take your child to burn off some energy outdoors every day, which will boost their wellbeing and make your life easier as they get calmer at home. It could be as simple as a stroll in the park or to the local playground, where they could run and enjoy the company of other children. If they like activities such as swinging, riding a bike, swimming, climbing or playing tag, you could schedule some time at the local playground or the swimming pool every week.

If your child is not used to getting outside, you could start slow and take a brief walk every day, maybe just before another indoor activity they enjoy. And if you are staying indoors, many children enjoy music and would love a dance party at home!

Get crafty

You could encourage your child's passion for colours or messy play by signing them up for art classes or setting up an art corner at home. Make sure they experiment with different materials and textures. If they have sensory issues or tend to eat inedible items, use safer tools such as paper, crayons, and safety scissors.

Schedule chill-out time

Allow rest before and after an activity daily and encourage them to engage in their special interests and independent play. Time to decompress is essential to recharge and enjoy the rest of the day, especially after a new activity which isn't usually part of their routine. They will enjoy chilling just as you will!

Hatch out a plan for new experiences

Summer is an excellent time to try new experiences, such as visiting museums, a local farm or an amusement park. Try and attend a few events with your children, where they can be surprised and experience the wider community. Hiking and playing in nature or dancing at open-air concerts are also great ways to spend a day off.

Organising activities in the community might be challenging; as you know, everything needs to be planned in advance and according to your child's needs. Preparation is key, and children will benefit from being told what is coming next. Try and use visual aids, social stories and timers to prepare them for the next thing. For example, if you are meeting someone you could show them their photo or the photo of their house. If you plan to visit a new place or spend the night at a hotel, you could arrange a viewing or look at some photos online, so your child will know what to expect.

Even during a special day, try and follow their daily routine as much as possible: try and respect their lunchtime and bedtime, for example, and after a busy day, nothing beats a lazy one to recharge.

Keep structure and expectations on

All children thrive in routine and benefit from a few rules and expectations. Keeping their routine in place could help smooth their transition to the summer holidays. A few ideas include getting the children dressed in the morning even if you are not planning for them to leave home, keeping their days structured, and scheduling a few school activities during the day.

Keeping a few rules in place is also advisable. Try and set a couple of expectations for your child during the summer - like tidying up with you after playing or time limits to tech access, for instance - and reinforce any positive behaviour with regards to their targets with social praise or access to favourite activities. It will help them understand that a few rules are still in place at home and possibly ease the transition back to school in September! (*Martina Lossi, Wellbeing Lead*).
